Dear Ms. Smith:

Thank you for your correspondence of March 4, 2001, concerning the hate propaganda provisions contained in the *Criminal Code* of Canada.

## The Criminal Code prohibits:

- advocating or promoting genocide against an "identifiable group," that is, any section of the public distinguished by colour, race, religion, or ethnic origin (section 318);
- inciting hatred against an "identifiable group" by communicating in a public place statements which are likely to lead to a breach of the peace (subsection 319(1)); and
- communicating statements, other than in private conversation, to wilfully promote hatred against an "identifiable group" (subsection 319(2)).

The Criminal Code defines "identifiable group" as any section of the public distinguished by colour, race, religion or ethnic origin. There have been suggestions that the list of "identifiable groups" be broadened to include sexual orientation. Others, such as yourself, have suggested including women. Others have proposed that the definition be expanded to cover all groups protected under section 15 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms.



As you may be aware, the Supreme Court of Canada found in the 1990 R. v. Keegstra case that the hate propaganda provisions infringe on the freedom of expression guaranteed by section 2(b) of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, but upheld the provisions because, as they currently apply, they are a reasonable limit demonstrably justified in a free and democratic society under section 1 of the Charter. Before deciding on amending the hate propaganda provisions, we need to ensure that the amendment will not disturb the delicate balance that currently exists in these provisions between two conflicting and valuable purposes: the freedom of expression and the need to protect vulnerable groups in our society. These matters are presently under consideration.
